

#### A. LAND AND CLIMATE

#### A.1 Land

Zanzibar lies off the Eastern Coast of Africa in the Indian Ocean and is situated about 30 kilometers from the mainland of East Africa. It is a low-lying island of coral formation, with an area of about 2,543 sq km of which 1,543 square kilometers for Unguja and the remaining 1,000 square kilometers is for Pemba Island, with number of habitant and unhabitant islets.

Cloves and seaweed are grown for export; fishing is also important to the local economy. Recently tourism has emerged to be the main source of revenues for the Revolutionary Government of Zanzibar (RGZ). The island's main sea port is located at Zanzibar Stone Town situated on the western coast. It has a fine landlocked harbor with docking facilities for both passengers and cargo ships. The main airport is Abeid Amani Karume International Airport situated in the western part of the main town.

#### A.2 Climate

The Zanzibar climate is warm and humid (equatorial). There are four seasons in a year i.e "Masika" experienced between March and May which is the main rainy season, Kipupwe in June to August which is the cold season, "Vuli" during the months of September to November which is a short rainy season and the hot season "Kaskazi" is experienced from December to February. The average highest peak of rain in 2017 in both Unguja and Pemba were recorded in May as shown in Table A.2.1 below. The islands experience high humidity between 73 and 88 percent in 2017 as shown in Table A.2.3.

#### B. ADMINISTRATION AND POLITICS

The Revolutionary Government of Zanzibar was formed on 12<sup>th</sup> January 1964 under the first President the late Hon. Abeid Amani Karume. Two independent states, Zanzibar and Tanganyika, united on 26<sup>th</sup> April 1964 to form the United Republic of Tanzania. Since then Zanzibar has come to be part of the union but with its own elected President, Legislature as well as Judiciary System (except court of appeal).

The Revolutionary Government of Zanzibar is now on its seventh phase and it is governed by His Excellency, Dr. Ali Mohamed Shein since 2010. This phase is operating through the Government of National Unity after the changes in the Zanzibar Constitution which allowed the opposition party to be included in the Government. Previous Presidents were;

#### **B.1** Administration

As at December 2017, the country had 19 members in the Revolutionary Council (which is also the Council of Ministers – Cabinet). The House of Representatives has 88 members of whom 54 are elected from Constituencies, 7 are nominated by the President, and 22 are special seats for women, one Secretary, one Attorney General and Speaker.

#### C POPULATION AND DEMOGRAPHIC STATISTICS

Population is a totality of all units of interest in a study or investigation at a given time and a given area. Population studies also analyzes the relationships between economic, social, cultural and biological processes influencing a population.

#### **C.1** Population Characteristics

The population of Zanzibar as of 2012 Tanzania Population and Housing Census (2012 TPHC) was 1,303,569 of which 51.6 percent were females. In 2017, the population has been projected to be 1,534,291 of which 51.4 percent were females. Despite this increase, proportion of female population decreased by 0.2 percent compared with 2012 and 2017 population. The population of Unguja in 2017 is estimated to be 1,031,692 and Pemba is estimated to be 502, 599. The population density for Zanzibar increased from 530-person/sq.km in 2012 to 603 person/sq.km in 2017, whereby Unguja and Pemba has 669-person/sq.km and 503-person/sq.km respectively.

The 2012 TPHC (Table C.1.5) confirms the predominance of large household size, especially in three regions (Mjini Magharibi, Kaskazini Pemba and Kusini Pemba). The Zanzibar average household size as per 2012 TPHC was 5.1. However, the current estimated population shows an uneven distribution in sex composition with a sex ratio of 95, meaning that for every 100 females there is 95 males an increase of one male from 94 males accounted in 2012 TPHC.

The population projection is useful in development planning, local administration, research, learning institutions and private business enterprises.

#### **C.2** Immigration Statistics

Tanzania Immigration Department issues various types of passports and Travel documents according to the Tanzania Passports and Travel Documents Act of 2002 and its Regulations, 2004. The Act provides various types of passports such as Ordinary, Service, East African and Diplomatic Passports.

The issuance of book passports is centralized at Immigration Head Quarters, Dar es Salaam as well Zanzibar, Head Office. The tables below show number of different types of Passports issuance and distributed by Immigration Department Zanzibar from the year 2014 to 2017.

Table C.2.1 reveals that the number of Ordinary Passport Issued in Zanzibar has been fluctuating from the year 2014 to 2017. The highest number of issued ordinary passports reported in 2015 (17,697) while the lowest number (11,287) was recorded in 2014. For the period of four years, the total number of Ordinary Passport issued to male were significantly higher than their female counterpart.

In 2014 a total of 189 East African passports were issued, which is the highest to be recorded from 2014 to 2017 (Table C.2.2). The least number was recorded in 2017 with only 20 East African passports issued.

A total of 429 Diplomatic Passports were issued in four consecutive years starting from 2014 to 2017, the highest issuance of passports (137) was recorded in 2015, Table C.2.3

#### D. SOCIAL STATISTICS

Social statistics comprise series of data from various sectors including education, health, crime statistics and social welfare (people with disability, orphans care and old people care).

#### **D.1** Education

The number of standard one pupils enrolled in public schools increased from 31,412 pupils in 2008 to 44,397 pupils in 2017 where as the number of pupils enrolled in private schools increased from 1,869 pupils in 2008 to 5,899 pupils in 2017(Table D.1.4). Gender wise, the number of boys pupils enrolled in standard one was higher in all years compared to girls pupils in both public and private schools.

The pupil-teacher ratio measures the number of pupils per teacher, on the assumption that a lower ratio of pupils to teaching staff means better pupils access to teaching resource. The lower the pupil teacher ratio, the availability of teacher services to pupils and vice versa. The result gives the pupil teacher ratio by type of school. It shows that, on average, the private school have slightly lower pupil teacher ratio than public schools(Table D.1.17).

The total number of teachers as of 2017 is 12,540 with 10,274 teaching in public schools and 2,266 in private schools. The percentage of untrained teachers is about one percent in public schools and about 18 percent in private schools (Table D.1.3).

#### D.2 Health

The aim of Revolutionary Government of Zanzibar is to provide free health services to all with particular emphasis to women and children. This evolves from the government's understanding that national development and good health for the population cannot be separated. This is well stated under the Zanzibar Development Plan "Vision 2020" and the Zanzibar Strategy for Growth and Reduction of Poverty (MKUZA II).

The government's intention is to provide health services to the level of Primary Health Care, Secondary and Tertiary. These levels have been categorized under UNICEF system for health facilities as Public Health Care Units (PHCU)/dispensaries; Public Health Care Centers (PHCC)/cottage hospitals and General Hospitals.

## Mode of data collection;

These data are produced by the Ministry of Health, Zanzibar through its Health Management Information System (HMIS) unit. The HMIS unit obtains its data from primary sources (routine data from health facilities) and secondary data (Population Census, National Surveys, and other health related surveys). Routine data predominantly collected from Public, private and NGOs health facilities while census and survey information are obtained from the Office of Chief Government Statistician. There are data such as admission and out patients are collected quarterly and others are collected annually.

# **D.3 Drug Statistics**

As of 2017, out of eight sober houses, there are seven sober houses for males' drug user and only one sober house for females' drug users (Table D.2.9)

The number of drug users in sober houses has decreased dramatically from 1,606 drug user in 2016 and reached 378 users in 2017. This reduction has been contributed on the success of distribution of Methadone alternative drug to the drug users at Mental hospital and also due to the establishment of others sober houses in Tanzania regions such as Dar es Salaam, Tanga and Morogoro (Table D.2.10)

#### **D.4** Crime Statistics

#### **Recorded Road Accidents**

In 2017, Table D.3.1 shows that the total number of accidents recorded were 595 and the highest number of killed persons during the accidents were cyclist (75) followed by pedestrians (59). These two accounted for 73.2 percent of all persons killed in the accidents. A traffic offence has been increasing with at least 10 percent annual growth in the last five years, and marks decreased of -0.2 percent in 2017 compared with the previous year. Dangerous/carelessness in driving is sighted as one of the main drivers to these offenses.

## **Crime Cases**

Table D.3.4 show that in 2017 nearly two thirds (64.6 percent) of accidents were minor cases and 35.4 percent were serious cases. Magharibi "B" district shows the highest number of cases followed by Mjini district (1,986 and 1,437 respectively), while Micheweni and Mkoani districts have fewer cases compared with other districts (197 and 493 respectively). The numbers of serious cases have increased from 3,046 in 2016 to 3,598 in 2017.

## **Offences against Persons**

Table D.3.7, The results show that number of offences against persons increased to 2,498 in 2017 from 2,181 in 2016, this was highly attributed by assault (1,288) and rape to girls (594). Community awareness was mentioned as one of the main reasons for increasing number of reported cases.

## **Prison Statistics**

Generally, there were more male inmates than females across all age groups. On the other hand, the large number of the inmates was aged 18-30 years old, whereby majority of them (97.6 percent) are males (Table D.3.5).

#### **Court Cases**

The findings show that the number of juvenile criminal cases for all three categories have increased between 2016 and 2017 (Table D.3.5)

### **D.5** Social Welfare

In 2017, Table D.4.2 indicates that the number of orphan's children cared and accommodated in both centre were 141 orphans people out of which 89 are male and 52 are female. The number of people accommodated in 2017 slightly increased by 28.2 percentage point from 2016. In general SOS centre handle more than twice children (101) children compare to Mazizini centre (40) children in 2017.

The number of old people cared decline from 223 people in 2010 to 126 people in 2017, so this represents decrease by 43.5 percent or 97 people. The number of male was greater (69) people compare to females (57) people in 2016 (Table D.4.3).

# E. LABOUR STATISTICS

Office of the Chief Government Statistician collects data on labour characteristics mainly from Formal Sector Employment and Earnings Survey (FSEES) and the Integrated Labour Force Survey (ILFS). FSEES is annual establishment based survey, usually undertaken in the month of June to all formal establishments for Government and parastatals as well as private establishments with employment size of one and above. The main objective of the FSEES is to provide information on employment and earnings which could be used for planning, policy formulation and decision making processes. The number of employees refers to month of June only, while cash earnings are covered for the whole financial year (July – June).

ILFS is household based undertaken after every five years. In order to take care of seasonality on employment data collection for ILFS runs for the whole year. This survey contains data for four major modules: Labour Force General, Informal Sector, Time Use and Child Labour.

## **E.2** Employment and Earnings

Total employment for all sectors (i.e. Government, Parastatals and Private) increased from 54,302 in 2016 to 56,140 in 2017 of whom males were 31,341 and females were 24,799 employees. Unlike the Government sector, both Government parastatals and private sectors had higher number of male employees than female employees. The total wage bill in 2017 was TZS 446,092 millions, TZS 329,218 millions of total wage bill used for cash and only TZS 17,819 millions of wage bill was free ration. In the Government sector, TZS 193,409 millions of its total wage bill used for cash where Government Parastatals and private sectors pay TZS 44,380 and TZS 91,429 million respectively.

#### Government

The total number of Government sector employees in 2017 was 31,342 in which the number of female employees (16,459) was higher than the total number of male employees (14,883). Generally, the number of employees was higher for male compared with that of female for many industries in 2017. Education (8,193) and Art, entertainment and recreation (108) industries had the highest number of female employees compared with other industries.

On the other hand, the annual wage bill by industry in a Government sector in 2017 shows that, TZS 193,409 millions of total wage bill used for cash and only TZS 3,324 millions of wage bill was free ration. However, Education sector spent more (TZS 82,420 millions) wage bill for cash compared with other industries.

### Parastatal

The total number of Parastatal employees in 2017 was 5,547 out of which 3,839 were male and 1,708 were female employees. Transportation and storage industry had the highest number of 1,766 employees compared with other industries. However, the number of employees was higher for males compared with females for many industries in 2017.

The results depict that a Parastatal sector consists of TZS 69,969 millions of total wage bill of which TZS 44,380 millions were from cash of employees, TZS 2,605 millions of free ration given in kind to employees and TZS 22,984 millions given as cash to employees as other benefits. Financial and insurance activities industry accounted for higher composition to total wage bill TZS 17,403 millions in 2017.

#### **Private**

In 2017, the total number of private employees was 19,251 of which 12,619 were males and 6,632 were females. Furthermore, Accommodation and food services activities had the highest number of 9,717 employees compared with other industries. Generally, the number of employees was higher for males compared with females for many industries in 2017.

Private wage bill for all industries accounts for TZS 126,417 millions of which, TZS 91,429 millions used for cash to employees, TZS 11,891 millions used as a free ration given to employees in-kind and TZS 23,097 millions used for other benefits. Accommodation and food service activities industry had higher contribution to total wage bill (TZS 65,992 millions) compared with other industries while Real estate activities had lower contribution (TZS 4 millions) to total wage bill.


### F. MACRO ECONOMICS STATISTICS

#### **F.1** National Accounts

GDP can be used to gauge the health of a country's economy. It can be defined as the monetary value of all finished goods and services produced within an economic territory in a specific period. It is measured in three approaches which are production, expenditure and income that are presented at current and constant prices. Currently the official GDP that are compiled at Office of the Chief Government Statistician is production approach alone. GDP is the most important indicator in the System of National Accounts (SNA)

It was observed that, the 2017 the economy has increase by 7.5 percent compared with 6.8 percent in 2016. This growth has been attributed by increase in clove production as well as the number of tourists from 376,242 in 2016 to 433,474 in 2017 which increased the share of accommodation and food services from 9.7 in 2016 to 11.5 percent in 2017. The major economic activities has shown a significant growth at 2017, Agriculture, forestry and fishing increased by 8.8 percent, Industries increased 7.9 percent, services has grown by Services and Taxes on Products has increased by 0.9 percent.

The level of GDP at current prices has risen to TZS 3,099 billion for 2017 from TZS 2,628 billions. Per capita income rose from TZS 1,806,000 from 2016 to TZS 2,020,000, at 2017.






Figure F.1.2: GDP Percentage Share by Sector, 2017

#### **F.2** Government Finance Statistics

#### Introduction

The Government Finance Statistics (GFS) is used to show the government expenditure by its functions (CoFoG) and economic activities of the government, including: government total revenue, government total expenditure, government balance (surplus/deficit), transactions in financial assets and liabilities, other changes in assets and liabilities and balance sheets.

### **Government Revenues and Expenditures**

The Revolutionary Government of Zanzibar recognizes domestic revenue of TZS 521.9 billion in 2016/17 compared with TZS 428.5 billion in 2015/16 whichillustrates an increase of 21.8 percent of annual growth rate. Eight one percent of the domestic revenue collected (TZS 478.1 billion) was from taxes while the remaining TZS 43.7 billion (19.0 percent) was from non-tax revenue. It was reported that, in 2016/17 external revenue of TZS 122.5 billion, of which TZS 69.9 billion was received as loans and the remaining amount (TZS 52.5 billion) was received as a grant to finance development projects in Zanzibar.

A total of TZS 590.1billion recorded as Government expenditure in 2016/17 showing anincreasing rate of 11.8 percent compared with TZS 520.3 billion in 2015/16. Out of the amount spent in 2016/17, recurrent expenditure was TZS 476.6 billion and development expenditure was TZS 113.5 billion which comprises TZS 51.3 billion from domestic revenue and TZS 62.3 billion from external revenue.

# F.3 Zanzibar Consumer Price Index (ZCPI)

Zanzibar Urban Consumer Price Index is a measure of the average change in prices paid by urban consumers for a fixed market basket of goods and services. It is not a cost of living index but a proxy indicator to it. Information is collected monthly at retail prices levels for selected items in each commodity group. The basket has been obtained from the 2014/15 Household Budget Survey and it uses the COICOP group specification, the basket has 343 items classified into twelve main groups.

The trend of the overall inflation rate in Zanzibar for the last six years remained in a single digit. The average annual inflation rate in 2017 was 5.6 percent compared with 6.7 percent reported in 2016; the average prices of goods and services in 2017 were lower compared with 2016. In 2016, the average annual food inflation rate was 8.4 percent and average non-food inflation rate was 4.8 percent while in 2017 annual food inflation rate was 5.5 percent and non – food inflation rate was 5.8 percent. The 2014/15 HBS adjusted non- institutional expenditure revealed that, 42.7 percent of households' budgets were spent on food consumed at homes. The main non - food items in the market basket were household's energy, fuel and utilities (18.4 percent), clothing (6.9 percent) and transport (9.6 percent). The overall total household expenditure for non-food items is 57.3 percent in which education and health have 1.9 percent and 2.1 percent respectively.



### G. PRODUCTION STATISTICS

# **G.1** Agriculture Statistics

Agriculture is an important sector of the Zanzibar's economy in terms of food and cash crops production as well as employment creation. Clove and seaweeds are the main cash crops leading for generating foreign currency. The agricultural sector contributes about 28.0 percent of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) (Economic Survey, 2017). Farmers grew a wide variety of food and cash crops as well as fruits, vegetables and spices.

The main types of livestock inspected and slaughtered in Zanzibar are cattle, goats, ducks and chicken. Data published in this statistical abstract cover all sub sectors of agricultural statistics that are crops, livestock, fisheries and forest resources. They describe the quantities and values of food and cash crops, fish catches, mining and forest products, number of livestock inspected and slaughtered quantity of cow milk and chicken eggs as well as weather data.

Agricultural data are collected from Ministry of Agriculture Natural Resources, Livestock and Fisheries and its departments and Agencies, as well as from Zanzibar State Trading Corporation (ZSTC), while weather data are collected from Tanzania Meteorological Agency, Zanzibar Office. Data provided are including routine data on estimates of food and cash crops.

# **Crop Cultivation**

The data show that, a total area used for cultivating various types of crops in 2017 was 91,270 acres whereby the largest planted area (29,017 acres) was used for paddy production presents 31.8 percent of the total planted area. Out of the total area used for paddy production 2,126.4 acres were used to cultivate paddy with irrigation technology, whilst the rest was used for rain feed. The second notch is followed by area planted with cassava which is 24,312.5 acres (26.6 percent) of the total planted area. The smallest area (169.3 acres), which is equivalent to 0.2 percent of the total reported area, was used for pawpaw cultivation.

The area planted with banana increased from 6,448.2 acre recorded in 2016 to 8,516.6 acre recorded in 2017, presenting an increase of 32 percent. While the total area under sweat potatoes also

increased to 4,886 acres in 2017 from 3,547.8 acres in 2016, presents an increase of 37.7 percent. The trend further shows that, area planted with various fruits and vegetables also increased, the area planted with amaranths and bitter aubergine increased from 825 acre recorded in 2016 to 1220 acre recorded in 2017, presents an increase of 48 percent.

The total production for various fruits and food crops were 357,932 tons recorded in 2017 presents an increase of 32.1percent compared with the production recorded in 2016 (111,883 tons). The highest production was Cassava with 142,714 tons, presents 40 percent of the total production; this followed by the production of banana 73,243 tons presents 20.5 percent of the total production. Paddy production was 39,683tons (11.1percent), sweet potatoes 9.6 percent and the lowest crop production recorded in 2017 was finger millet which accounted for less than 0.1 percent.

#### Fish catch

The quantity of fish caught in 2017 has increased by 3.4 percent compared to the previous year of 2016. The total quantity of fish caught has reached 35,057 tons with the total value of TZS 164,099.2 million.

### **Production of Cash Crops**

The quantity of cloves produced in 2017 increased by 77 percent compared with that produced in 2016, furthermore the quantity of cloves stem produced also increased by 67 percent compared with the quantity produced in 2016. The production of seaweed in 2017 decreased by -1.2 percent compared with the quantity produced in previous year.

### **Slaughtered Animals**

The number of inspected slaughtered cattle for the year 2017 dropped by 17.8 percent compared with that of 2016. However the number of goats, chicken and duck inspected and slaughtered in 2017 increased by 61.4 percent, 15.9 percent and more than 100 percent respectively compared with the year 2016.

#### **Forest Resource**

The forest and woody resources play an important role in the daily livelihood of the people of Zanzibar. They are very important sources of energy for cooking, building timber, tourism, fodder, water catchments, shelters for wildlife and estuaries for fish breeding areas. Due to ever increasing demands of forest products in Zanzibar, the forest resources are facing severe exploitation pressure. Well managed forest resources can effectively contribute towards sustainable social and economic development of Zanzibar, at the same time maintaining its environmental integrity.

The native forest area in Zanzibar is 86,182 ha; 71,068 ha in Unguja and 15,114 ha in Pemba. Intermediate coral rag vegetation is the biggest land use and land cover (LULC) class in Unguja with 35,057 ha and 22.1 percent share of the land area and in Pemba the mixture of trees and

agricultural crops LULC class is largest with an area of 22,482 ha and 22.2 percent of the land area (Zanzibar Woody Biomass Survey, 2013).

The data on forest resources are collected from licensed timber cutting from government forest plantations and public land. In addition the Islands are surrounded by mangrove and other beach trees used in house construction. The Department of forestry and Non renewable Resources is concerned with the management of forest resources in the country.

### **Quantity of Forest Products**

Data on forest products shows that beam production for the year 2017 decreased by 3.6 percent (2,368.8 m³) compared with its production recorded in 2016. Building poles production has also dropped by 4 percent i.e. from 3,442 m³ of 2016 to 3,304 m³. Similar trend had been observed for Medium pole production of which decreased by 3.4 percent compared to its production in 2016. Production of medium poles in 2016 was 3,138 m³ and decreased to 3,031 m³ in 2017. The withes production and charcoal also decreased by 1.5 and 4.3 percent respectively compared to its production in 2016. Contrary, the production of firewood for the 2017 increased from 19,532 m³ to 23,114 m³ present an increase of 18.3 percent compared to its production in 2016.

### **G.2** Industry

Zanzibar industrial activities are centered mainly on small and medium scale processing of domestic goods; food processing, beverages and processing of agricultural products. Industrial sector includes all establishments engaged in activities that fall under mining (for Zanzibar this is mainly quarrying), manufacturing, generation and distribution of electricity, gas and water. This is as recommended in International Recommendations on Industrial Statistics.

#### **G.2.1** Selected Commodities

The results show that, the production of the selected commodities has decreased by 8.7 percent in 2017. This was attributed to a decrease in the production of diary product, Sugar and wheat bran. Production of wheat flower increased from 23,834 tones in 2016 to 25,196 tones in 2017 which is equivalent to 5.7 percent mainly due to the increase in market demand. Noodles production increased from 181,872 kg in 2016 to 247,350 kg in 2017 (30.0 percent), this was due to its high market demand and it is a seasonal product.

Production of garments (Dash Dash) has increased from 3,674 pcs in 2016 to 5,060 pcs in 2017 equivalent to 37.7 percent, this was largely attributed to an increase in demand.

The production in public industries (clove stem oil, printing services and electricity distribution) has increased from TZS 87,957,637 thousands in 2016 to TZS 95,333,220 thousands in 2017 (8.4 percent). Private industries (beverages, wheat flour, diary product and garments) in 2017 have the lower value of production (TZS 67,696,691 thousands) than public industries.

## H. TRADE, TOURISM AND TRANSPORT

#### H.1 External and Inter - State Trade

Trade statistics gives brief explanation of flows/directions of trade balances and volumes, specializations (comparative advantage) and their economic influence.

External trade statistics are compiled from documents provided by exporters and importers to the Tanzania Revenue Authority. It should also be noted that goods crossing international borders without appropriate Customs documentation would not be included in external trade.

Exports statistics includes domestic export and re-export. Domestic export refers to exports of goods of national origin while re-export refers to goods exported in the same condition as imported or after undergoing minor operations which leave them essentially unchanged.

Trade balance is the difference in the value of exports and imports. Zanzibar has never experience a positive balance of trade; this means that Zanzibar imports more than exports.

Inter-State trade statistics provides an idea about the demand of commodities produced or consumed in Zanzibar along with flows thereof to the other side of country that is Tanzania Mainland.

In 2017, Zanzibar recorded a total trade value of TZS 357,170.2 millions which indicates an increase of 35.6 percent compared with TZS 263,322.9 million recorded in 2016.

#### **Findings**

The recorded export values in 2017 was TZS 145,756.8 millions which is higher by 51.5 percent compared with TZS 96,234.9 million recorded in 2016.

The value of the imports in 2017 was TZS 211,413.2 millions which indicates an increase of 26.5 percent compared with 167,088.0 recorded in 2016.

The trade balance in 2017 has shown a deficit of TZS 65,656.5 millions compared with the deficit of TZS 70,853.1 million recorded in 2016.

Vegetable products contributed TZS 130,098.8 million equivalents to 89.3 percent of the total export value in 2017.

The exported value of Cloves recorded in 2017 was TZS 119,887 million which is equivalent to 83.6 percent of the total value. For the previous four years (2013-2016), India appeared to be the major buyer of the exported commodities from Zanzibar, especially cloves although for 2017 Singapore are leading country and followed by India.

Singapore recorded the highest value of import in 2017 which worth TZS 74,258.3 million, followed by India which recorded TZS 38,753.9 million.

Machinery & Mechanical Appliances, Electrical product recorded the highest value for import (TZS 39,595.6 million) in 2017. As for the importation, the trend of the imported values is non-directional.


The import of fuel products in 2017 increased except Kerosene shows a decrease compared with previous year. The five years trend (2012 -2017) shows that year 2017 has the highest import of these products except for Kerosene.

#### H.2 Tourism

This section consists of information of tourist arrivals into Zanzibar through major entry points, visitors by nationality, sex composition of visitors and their purpose of visit for both international and domestic tourists.

Findings from Figure H.2.1 show that August recorded the highest number of visitors (51,937), followed by December (51,112) while May had the least number of visitors (15,696).

Figure H.2.2 and Table H.2.7 show that the year 2017 recorded the highest number of visitor arrivals that has never been recorded before. The number of visitors increased by 15.2 percent to 433,474 in the year 2017 from 376,242 visitors recorded in 2016. The remarkable increase of the visitors in 2014 was caused by the increase of the data collection coverage compared with previous years. Previously, the record was only for the visitors who directly entered Zanzibar and excluded those came from Tanzania Mainland.

In country wise, Italy continue to dominate the tourism market in Zanzibar by accounting for 12.0 percent of all visitors in 2017 and posted a growth of 11.1 percent compared with last year, followed by German (9.8 percent) and Britain (8.1 percent) while New Zealand continue to be the least (0.3 percent) as shown in the table H.2.1.

A total of 361,645 visitors (83.4 percent) visited Zanzibar through Airport, of whom 254,590 came by international flights and 107,055 by domestic flights from various regions of Tanzania Mainland. The remaining visitors 71,829 (16.6 percent) entered through Seaport whereby 2,959 visitors arrivals were day visitors (excursionist) and 68,870 visitors came by ferry boat from Tanzania Mainland.

Composition by sex suggests more females visited Zanzibar than males. There were 197,113 (45.5 percent) males and 236,361 (54.5 percent) females who entered Zanzibar in 2017. Males increased by 20.3 percent and females by 11.3 percent compared with last year. Majority of visitors (97.7 percent) came to Zanzibar for leisure/holidays. (Table H.2.3 & Table H.2.4).


The number of visitors from emerging markets for the year 2017 grew by 16.4 percent compared with last year. Data further reveal that, although Israel has the highest number of visitors from the emerging countries, Russia showed a remarkable increase of 87 percent compared with last year. Generally, the data show that majority of the emerging countries prevailed an increase of visitors in 2017 except Ukraine and China that showed a decrease compared with year 2016 (Table H.2.5).

The data from Table H.2.6 shows that the peak season is usually observed in either August or December for the previous ten years, except for the year 2014 and 2016 whereby the peak was observed in February and October respectively.

The number of Hotels/Guest Houses increased from 452 in 2016 to 473 in 2017. There was high number of Hotels/Guest Houses in South District (154) followed by North A District (112) as shown in Table H.2.8 and Table H.2.9.



Figure H.2.1: International Visitors Arrival by Month, 2017





### H.3 Utility, Energy and Fuel

This section presents statistics on water, electricity and imports of fuels products that government intervention has been largely focused on. The section provides data on water supply, electricity distributed and imports of fuel products.

Data in water supply are collected on routine basis and only in annual, while electricity distribution are collected on quarterly and annual as well.

#### H.3.1 Water Supply

The amount of water supplied in 2017 was 39,738,140 cubic meters whereas the estimated demand was 67,167,935 cubic meters, this indicate a total deficit of 40.8 percent in demand.

The highest water supply by region was recorded in Mjini Magharibi Region where 13,113,980 cubic meters were supplied followed by Kusini Pemba Region with 7,273,204.0 cubic meters. The region with the lowest water supply was Kaskazini Unguja whereby there were only 6,022,412 cubic meters supplied.

The total revenue collected for water supply in 2017 was TZS 2,449,472,845.5 with the highest revenue collected from Mjini Magharibi Region amounting TZS 1,329,627,747.0 (54.2 percent) followed by Kusini Pemba with total revenue of TZS 363,873,654.1 (14.9 percent). The Region with the lowest revenue collected was Kusini Unguja with the total amount of TZS 189,125,968.8 (15.2 percent).

The number of Boreholes drilled in 2017 decreased by 24.2. percent from 33 boreholes drilled in 2016 to 25 boreholes in 2017.

#### **H.3.2** Electricity

The recorded number of new customers connected to National Power Grid in 2017 is 12,479, which is smaller by (2.3 percent compared with 12,768 in 2016.

The quantity of electricity sold to different customers decreased by 6 percent from 326,606 thousand KWH in 2016 to 311,667 thousand KWH in 2017, and the value of electricity distributed increased by 8.1 percent i.e. from TZS 86,626,356 thousands to TZS 160,424,040 thousand this is due to an increase in electricity Tariff.

### **H.4** Transport and Communications

This section presents statistics on transport and communication. Transport stastistics comprise of data on road network, movements/trips (enter/exit, traffic handling of passengers and cargo – both at airports and seaports as well as information on number of motor vehicles registration and licenses issued to both public and private automobiles. Communication data comprise of number of registered radio and television, internet subscribers and internet users.

#### H.4.1 Transport

The transport sector plays a big socio-economic role in the movements of people and distribution of goods and services. The transport system in Zanzibar is divided into:

- a. Interregional transport between Islands, Mainland and the coastal area of Eastern Africa.
- b. Local internal transport within each island.
- c. The rest of the world

The number of trips (enter/exit of marine vessel in 2017 increased by 19.6 percent compared with 7,227 trips recorded in 2016. Number of passengers handled at Unguja and Pemba seaports increased by 5.3 percent to reach 2,592,000 in 2017 from 2,461,000 recorded in 2016. The volume of Cargo handled at Seaports in 2017 incressed by 11 percent compared with 2016. A total of 73,351 TEUs were recorded in 2017 decreased by four percent compared with 76,787 in 2016.

A total of 15,684 motor vehicles were registered in 2017, which shows a decrease of 2.1 percent compared with 16,022 recorded in 2016. Motor Car, Estate car and Station wagons covered nearly half (47.1 percent of the new registered vehicles in 2017.

A total of 1,256.3 kilometres of road were constructed in the year 2017, whereby 714.8 kilometres were in the level of paving while the remaining 541.5 kilometres were at unpaved level.

International aircraft movements in Zanzibar Airports increased by 13 percent in 2017 compared 2016. All these movements were recorded at Abeid Aman Karume International Airport (AAKIA while Pemba recorded none. A total of 56,682 domestic aircraft movents were also recorded, of which eight of every ten movements (81.7 percent were recorded in AAKIA while only two (18.3 percent were recorded at Pemba Airport.

The number of passengers handled at Zanzibar Airports in 2017 reached 1,171,142 which shows an incraese of 11.9 percent compared with 2016. Among them, 578,977 pesssengers embarked and 592,165 disemberked. A total of 4,117.45 tons of freights were handled Zanzibar Airports in 2017 which indicates a remarkable increase of more than hundred percent compared with year 2016, of which a freights of 169.38 tons were loaded and 3948.07 tons were unloaded.

#### **H.4.2** Communication Statistics

Communication statistics comprise services of radio and television, telephone, internet subsrciptions as well internet users. Communication facilities are vital parts of a nation's infrastructure. The commercial, political, social, cultural and industrial development of any nation depends largely on the efficiency of its communication systems. This is because the proximity of any two given communities is realistically not as much a function of physical distance as of accessibility via various means of communications. These facilitate intra-community relationships at various levels in the country and also enhance the fundamental basis for relationships between the country and the rest of the world.

In 2016, the number of national Television stations increased to 17 from 13 recorded in 2016, while one radio station also increased from in 2017. Internet Users increased from 477,562 in 2015 to 556,477 in 2016. There is no new telephone tower constructed in 2017 that resulted the same amount as recorded in 2016.
